

Five hundred people Saturday afternoon representing 7 states witnessed dedication of stadium recently built at Monte Ne by W.H. (Coin) Harvey, Monte Ne's founder. The chief features were a program of music and readings by the music department of the Ozark Industrial School located there and an address by Harvey, nationally known writer, philosopher, and builder of "The Pyramid." The stadium is built of concrete for the purpose of strengthening the base of the foundation of the Pyramid and for the use of public gatherings. It will seat 1,000 persons. . . . Harvey was introduced by O.J. Read, formerly a well known Texas editor, spending the summer in Monte Ne. Harvey, whose subject was "The Pyramid," reverted to his old-time methods in his speech, that of a teacher and pupil, using three classes of students of the Industrial School to illustrate the 10 subjects on which character building is based, namely common good, cheerfulness, honesty, industrial, self reliance, home ownership and habitat as the positive forces, and prejudice, vanity, and selfishness as negative forces.
